# Step 1: Finding Your Place Review

## Google Earth Pro Introductory Guide



### Opening screen

- After clicking the desktop icon on your computer the Google Earth Pro opening screen will look something like this.
- Navigation controls are on the top right. More control can be gained by using a mouse. Find out how each works and use which suits you best. Use the Help menu to find some useful keyboard shortcuts.
- Along the top horizontal row are a series of drop-down menus and a row of icons for specific tasks.
- On the left side of the screen a column will have three headings in blue with an arrow next to each Search; Places; Layers.
- Clicking the arrow for each will open up a drop-down sub-list.



### Get to know the three main categories in the left column

- Search. Type in a place name (e.g. Clifford's Tower, York) and Search or hit enter/return on the keyboard. The image will move and zoom to York. Street names and various other places of interest can easily be found this way.
- Places. Places you are interested in can be stored and displayed using [Places](#) (see below).
- Layers. Expand by clicking the arrow. Features which can be displayed over the aerial Imagery are listed. Some can be expanded to show further categories of features. Tick and [untick](#) each to see the effect on the Imagery. Zoom in and out to see the effect at different scales.

### Getting to the maps

- There is a long list of available resources with links. If you scroll down you will see what the resources are and can explore them later.
- Have a look at the Basic Resources group. This gives access to mapping from the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland at various scales.
- For England, Scotland and Wales visit by <http://www.ordnancesurvey.co.uk/online-mapping> online to get user changing scale.
- Maps for Northern Ireland, Republic of Ireland, Isle of Man and Guernsey can be viewed using the [Search](#) box in the Resources group (see below). Online mapping for Jersey is very limited.
- Start by searching for 'York' using the Current OS [Search](#) box online. It will default to the 1:50000 scale [OSMapOnline](#) map but use the mouse or the screen controls at the top left to see OS maps at other scales. You can also use the zoom in and out buttons to show levels of detail each scale of map above for that location.
- As well as finding your own place, take a journey across the UK and look at places that you have never been to or would like to go.
- The search box in the top right will display National Grid References in Latitude and Longitude (Ordnance Survey map), and Latitude and Longitude coordinates.
- See what coverage of each scale and type of map provides for your area. Coverage and scales vary, especially for the Channel Islands. The Guernsey site is particularly good, showing records for archaeological sites and monuments and historic aerial photography.





# Language barrier

- **Statutory – Designations (National)**
- **Scheduled monuments** - a scheduled monument is a site that's legally protected because of its historical importance
- **Listed building** - marks and celebrates a building's special architectural and historic interest, and also brings it under the consideration of the planning system, so that it can be protected for future generations.
- **Designated Heritage Asset** - a World Heritage Site, Scheduled Monument, Listed Building, Protected Wreck Site, Registered Park and Garden, Registered Battlefield or Conservation Area designated under the relevant legislation.
- **Non-Statutory** - everything else
- **Local** – county/local authority/local body

## Starting from scratch c. 1970s

- Ordnance Survey archaeology division card index records for whole of UK, excluding NI which had its own (Non-Statutory).
- Department of the Environment records for scheduled monuments, listed buildings (Statutory).

# Creation of digital databases

## c. 1970s to the present day

### Acronym hell!

NMR; SMR; HER; SAM; ADS and lots, lots more

- **No coordinated approach.** Lots of different databases started to evolve for each country and counties – buildings, photographs, archaeological sites; finds; excavations etc. Levels of detail differ. Different mapping systems and database software used.
- **Result - no single UK-wide electronic database.** Subsequent separate recording policies and databases for each country and counties



## Map Layers



### Airborne Mapping

Airborne Mapping shows archaeological features observed from above from sources such as aerial photographs, Airborne Laser Scanning (ALS or Lidar), and satellite imagery.

This information is shown as different colours of lines on the map in the Airborne Mapping layer. Currently it is only available in East Lothian. Fife will be the next area covered.

Canmore Areas contains known site extents for archaeological monuments in Scotland. The map shows the present extent of mapping using the Defining Scotland's Places methodology. This methodology was developed in 2010 and has gone on to be adopted by the Scottish Historic Environment Data group as its preferred Technical Specification for mapping the extent of archaeological monuments of Scotland.







## DUNGANNON CASTLE, O'NEILL'S CASTLE

This castle is traditionally said to have been built by Domnall O'Neill sometime in the first 2 decades of the C14th. The castle was captured in c1498 by the 8th Earl of Kildare & demolished in 1590 by the O'Donnells. In 1607 Dungannon was granted to Sir Arthur Chichester who removed what was left of the old castle & built a bawn 36m square with 4 flankers. It was captured by the O'Neills in 1641 & was destroyed in 1646. A round tower of Thomas Knox Harrington's mansion of c1790 lies on the site. There are no visible remains of the original castle, but there may well be remains below ground (after Salter, M. 1993, 146). Excavations at 2-4 Castle Hill, just SW of the castle uncovered part of a substantial ditch and also the remains of a well. The earliest feature uncovered was the large subsoil-cut ditch, a sample from the lower fill of which was dated to cal AD 1438-1490 and one of the upper fills contained a sherd of 17th-century pottery. The ditch trended NE-SW and terminated at the N end within the excavated area. A total length of 7.5m was uncovered; it was a maximum of 2.8m wide and internal deposits (fill) were 1.2m deep. Towards the SE corner of the site, within the area enclosed by the ditch, a circular feature was uncovered, believed to be the remains of a well. The upper fill produced post-medieval pottery (brown wares) and it appeared to have been deliberately back-filled. It is suggested that the well may be of medieval date. The ditch is mostly likely to have related to the castle, possibly forming part of a larger outer defensive enclosure; it may be the same as the ditch shown on Bartlett's 1603 map and as reported by Pynnar in 1619 [ADs, 2007]. An evaluation was carried out in an area of wasteland adjacent to the Orange Hall car park on Castle Hill for the relocation of a telecom mast and associated structures now on the hill summit. No features of potential archaeological interest were recognised under modern disturbance, recent deposits and pipe-trenches [CAF, March 08]


